At your next meeting or event, try something new to bring out a few extra smiles. It's the simple things that create lasting bonds and make clubs simply irresistible.



## Treasurer's Page

As members of this esteemed organization, we are all committed to making a positive difference in our communities and the world at large. A critical part of ensuring the success of our initiatives lies in the timely payment of our monthly dues.

Our monthly dues are more than just a financial obligation; they represent our collective commitment to keeping the Rotary Club strong, active, and effective. These funds support essential administrative costs, enable us to contribute to Rotary International initiatives, and ensure that our club remains vibrant and impactful.

Many Rotarians know that a portion of their dues pays for club and district expenses, as well as Rotary International operations worldwide, but few know exactly how that all breaks down. Dues are extremely important, as they are the single biggest source of revenue providing the services you enjoy as a Rotarian.

Currently, RI dues are \$53. Depending on where you are in the world, that equates to about 4 to 14 percent of your total membership dues. The rest primarily covers club and district expenses, and a subscription to The Rotarian or your regional magazine. On July 1 and again on January 1 of each year, we are billed by Rotary International based on the active members listed on our club roster. Our club must pay based on the number of members listed on these dates. If someone chooses to leave Rotary or our club after that date, then we are still liable for paying their dues.

Let us all take a moment to review our dues status and ensure that we are current with our payments. If you haven't yet updated your dues, now is the time to act. Your contribution, no matter how small it may seem, makes a significant difference.

Let's work together to maintain our financial health and uphold our shared commitment to Rotary's mission.





"A JOURNEY OF COURAGE, LEADERSHIP AND SERVICE" by: PAG May Urbano

**ROTARIAN Mary Nancy Gadian's** life is a remarkable journey of service, leadership, and courage. From her decorated military career to her selfless community service, she exemplifies the values of Rotary and the essence of being a true public servant.

#### Military Excellence and Courage

Rtn. Mary Nancy's career began in the Philippine Navy, where her leadership and dedication quickly distinguished her. As a former Lieutenant Senior Grade of the Philippine Navy, she demonstrated exceptional commitment and skill throughout her service. In 1989, she was recognized as the Philippine Navy's Most Outstanding Midshipwoman and honored by then-President Corazon Aquino as the AFP Cadette of the Year. Her commitment to excellence saw her graduate at the top of multiple military courses, earning numerous accolades, including a Certificate of Merit from the Flag Officer in Command of the Philippine Navy.

Her service extended to challenging assignments in conflict-ridden areas such as Sulu, where she worked tirelessly to provide critical humanitarian aid. She played a vital role in coordinating relief during the 2003 Siocon Siege in Zamboanga del Norte, earning the prestigious Gawad sa Kaunlaran for her socio-economic and humanitarian efforts. As a whistleblower during the administration of President Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo, she exposed a significant corruption scandal involving high-ranking Military Officials, the misuse of Balikatan Exercise funds in which she served as Balikatan Exercise planning and Civil Military Operation Officer. Despite the personal risks to her safety and that of her family, she courageously took a stand to uphold justice. This act of bravery later led to her resignation from the military in 2009, yet her commitment to serving the nation did not end there.

#### **Educator and Advocate for Lifelong Learning**

After her military service, Rtn. Mary Nancy pursued a new mission: **EDUCATION**. She became a preschool teacher in Thailand and Cambodia before returning to her hometown of Polomolok. Today, she is a Maritime Consultant and also a faculty member at Notre Dame of Siena College of Polomolok, sharing her expertise in Allied and Education courses. Her dedication to nurturing young minds is complemented by her academic achievements, including a Ph.D. in Education from the Philippine Women's University.

#### A Rotarian Committed to Service

Joining the Rotary Club of Polomolok 101, Rtn. Mary Nancy has embraced Rotary's mission of service above self. She actively participates in initiatives that uplift underserved communities, particularly Indigenous People's groups and remote barangays. She is also a regular benefactor of the Mercyville Orphanage Children Center, providing vital support to vulnerable children.

#### A Life of Humility and Impact

Despite her numerous accolades and accomplishments, Rtn. Mary Nancy remains humble, prioritizing service over recognition. Her life's work-from her military heroism to her community service and educational contributions—has made a lasting impact on countless lives. She is a shining example of how one individual can embody the values of Rotary and inspire others to do the same.

Rtn. Mary Nancy Gadian's unwavering dedication to excellence, integrity, and community service makes her a role model and a deserving Outstanding Alumna of Notre Dame of Polomolok 2024. She continues to inspire us all with her quiet strength and relentless commitment to making the world a better place.







Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) affects millions of people worldwide. It impacts how individuals communicate, learn, and interact with others. Unfortunately, autism is still widely misunderstood, leading to stigma and barriers for those on the spectrum. That's why autism awareness campaigns are vital—and Rotary clubs are in a unique position to make a difference.

- 1. Promoting Understanding and Acceptance- Many people don't fully understand autism or its effects on individuals and families. This lack of awareness often creates a divide between those on the spectrum and the rest of the community. By educating people through awareness campaigns, Rotary can break down misconceptions and encourage compassion and acceptance. A well-informed community is one that embraces diversity and ensures everyone feels included.
- 2. Supporting Families and Caregivers- Families caring for children with autism often face emotional, financial, and logistical challenges. They may struggle to access resources or feel isolated from their communities. Rotary's campaigns help shine a light on these struggles while connecting families with valuable resources like therapy programs, support groups, and specialized education tools.
- 3. Creating Inclusive Communities- Rotary's mission is to build inclusive and equitable communities, and autism awareness aligns perfectly with this goal. By fostering understanding, Rotary helps create spaces—schools, workplaces, and public areas—that are more accommodating to individuals with autism. Small changes, such as sensory-friendly activities or staff training, can make a huge impact.
- 4. Encouraging Early Intervention- Awareness campaigns also play a role in emphasizing the importance of early diagnosis and intervention. When autism is identified early, children can access therapies that help them develop essential skills. Rotary can help spread this message and empower parents to seek early support.
- 5. Rotary Clubs in Action: Benefit Dinner for a Cause- The Rotary Clubs of Area 3FGH are leading by example. On January 25, we are hosting a Benefit Dinner at Greenleafe Hotel in celebration of Autism Awareness Month. This event aims to raise funds for a meaningful cause: purchasing special kits for children with autism, aged 5-8 years old, in coordination with SPED (Special Education) schools. These kits will provide essential tools to support the learning and development of special children, making a direct impact in their lives.

By attending the event or contributing to the cause, you'll not only enjoy an evening of community and goodwill but also help create a brighter future for children with autism.

History of the Rotary Club of Polomolok IOI

The Rotary Club of Polomolok 101 was officially chartered as a legitimate club by Rotary International, through the efforts of its mother club — the Rotary Club of Midtown Gensan on August 31, 2005. As early as February 2003, there were already numerous attempts to organize a Rotary club in the municipality of Polomolok, but it was only in January 2005 when persistence finally paid off. With the blessing of RC Midtown Gensan, Omar Gallinero became the new club's Charter President, leading 25 other charter members with various classifications. Rotary Club of Polomolok 101 was formed under the leadership of Len Magno as then the District Governor of 3860. The club's name is suffixed with the number 101 for two significant reasons: one, the club was founded on Rotary International's 101st foundation anniversary; and the club was the 101st club to be chartered under District 3860.

The Rotary Club of Polomolok 101 was registered under District 3860, Area 3F with Club Number 70517. To date, the Club runs on man-strength of twenty five(25) committed individuals.
